

Despite living many kilometres away from her family, Timor-Leste native, Luciana Celeste Amaral accomplished her goal and graduated with a Postgraduate Diploma in Nursing (Emergency Nursing) at the Fiji National University's College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences (CMNHS) April graduation ceremony.

She could not contain her tears, being the lone graduate in the programme.

The 48-year-old mother of three travelled to Fiji in 2023 to pursue her studies. A year later, her hard work and commitment to her education finally pay off.

She is a nurse with 22 years experience, working at the Guido Valadares National Hospital in Timor-Leste, and giving back to her country is one of her top

Amaral joined the FNU after hearing from a friend, also from Timor-Leste, about the programmes under the CMNHS.

"I gathered information from my friend who was also a student at the CMNHS about the programmes offered, and I was interested to apply and study as well," she said.

"I applied and got my Offer Letter, interestingly this was my first time to come to Fiji!

'Whatever I have learnt throughout my educational journey at the FNU, the next step is implementation for me when I return and see which areas I need to improve on.'

She revealed that the main challenge for her was being away from her family in a foreign country, but she immediately felt welcomed and at home in Fiji.

Being in a new country without family was a major challenge. I was missing my family, but I felt welcomed in Fiji. Learning from Fijians and friends from other countries filled the void and gave me strength to focus on my studies," she said.

'My aim is to continue my education later. I am grateful to the FNU for giving me an opportunity to study."

'My father was a teacher, and this is where I was introduced to sports and developed an interest in rugby and athletics," said Bose.

"He then joined the FNU in 2009 to oursue his studies.

Bose's career began with the Fiji Sports Commission as Assistant Sports Development Officer West in 2013. In 2015, he was promoted to Sports Development Officer North, and later joined the Fiji Rugby Union in his current role.

"My responsibility includes looking after training and education, where we conduct courses like coaching, strength and condition, First Aid, admin courses, and also look after secondary and primary schools solely focusing on rugby," he said.

Nowadays, sports is becoming a big industry with many career pathways and opportunities. For instance, athletes are receiving major benefits like scholarships and professional contracts. This is exactly what we want for students, to be part of that journey and achieve similar success.'

The BSEES programme, now in its second year with FNU's College of Humanities and Education, is known to cater to the demands of the industry in the provision of qualified sports scientists to develop sports in Fiji and the region.

Presently, the BSEES programme is the only sports science Degree programme offered locally and

FNU Empowers Future Leaders

The Fiji National University (FNU) is shaping the future by empowering senior secondary school students with insightful career guidance sessions. This recent initiative targeted students from Saint Joseph Secondary School, Suva Grammar School, and Ballantine Memorial School.

FNU's outreach team aimed to broaden students' educational horizons and equip them with knowledge of the diverse career paths offered by the university. The interactive sessions exposed students to a range of academic options, from certificate, diploma, and higher education programmes.

Saint Joseph Secondary School's Assistant Principal, Asena Waqanicakau, emphasised the importance of early guidance for secondary school students.

"While careers expo often targets senior secondary school students, we involve our Year 9 students with the aim that they are able to identify future career paths and align them with subject choices when they reach Year 11," said Waqanicakau.

At the Suva Grammar School Careers Fair, Eliki Baleinakama, visited FNU's booth to enquire about

"We were fortunate to have FNU here advising us of our future endeavours after high school and to turn our dreams into reality," said the Suva Grammar School student.

Representatives from FNU's five colleges and the National Training and Productivity Centre (NTPC) and the Pacific Centre for Marine Studies (PCMS) presented comprehensive programme details and overview of FNU's comprehensive services, providing a well-rounded understanding of the university's offerings.

The spotlight on Technical, Vocational and

Education Training (TVET) programmes highlighted second-chance opportunities for students who may not have excelled in traditional academics.

Ballantine Memorial School Vice-Principal, Mrs Emi Veilawa, applauded FNU's approach of bringing career pathways directly to students.

"Having college representatives present was incredibly valuable. Students were able relate and ask questions comfortably, gaining a clearer understanding of career paths

linked to their chosen subjects," she explained.

Meanwhile, eleven Year 13 students from Cicia High School in Lau, delved into exploring FNU's central campuses and programmes. This visit was particularly impactful for these students given their limited access to the internet on their island, according to School head girl, Kesaia Temo.

"We were able to hear directly from campus representatives the different programmes and pathways available for us once we complete high school. A few of us have already identified what career path we will take up at FNU," said Temo.

Mocevakaca paves way for women in Fiji's dairy industry

Wati Tomasi Mocevakaca, a rising researcher with a passion for animal science, recently earned a Master of Science in Agriculture, specialising in livestock

She graduated from the Fiji National University's College of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (CAFF) in the April Graduation ceremony.

Mocevakaca's research tackled the underdevelopment of Fiji's dairy industry, aiming to establish vital baseline data and pave the way for future growth and inclusivity within the sector.

Hailing from Lau with maternal links to Rewa, Mocevakaca completed her Bachelor's degree in Veterinary Science in 2022.

Recognising the significant gap in knowledge and skilled professionals within Fiji's dairy sector, especially for women, she pursued her Master's programme with the support of the Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR).

"The lack of knowledge and women in leadership roles are significant hurdles for Fiji's dairy industry.

'My research directly addresses these challenges by establishing baseline data, paving the way for a more inclusive and prosperous future for women and the entire sector.'

Mocevakaca expressed her deepest gratitude for the invaluable support provided by ACIAR.

"Their generous funding programme went beyond simple financial aid.

ACIAR provided the resources and mentorship needed for in-depth research, especially crucial for women pursuing leadership roles in agriculture. Their commitment to empowering researchers like me is truly inspiring.'

Furthermore, Mocevakaca expresses appreciation for her supervisor, Dr Royford Magiri, who has mentored her for the past five years.

"Dr Magiri instilled in me a passion to bridge the gender gap and make a positive impact on the dairy industry.

"My parents' unconditional support has been the foundation upon which I have built my success. I am incredibly proud to be the first person in my family to earn a Master's degree, especially in a field where women are often underrepresented."

"I was able to get a certificate at the age of 72. and if I can do it, then others can do it for themselves and for their families. There is no age requirement when it comes to education, and we should welcome every opportunity to learn new things in life."

Tavura briefly worked as a helping hand at the Police Mobile Force in Narere, Nasinu, before returning to his village, where he is currently involved in fishing and farming.

"I am glad that the Fiji National University thought of our people and brought the courses to our village,"

The fair provided a valuable platform for the two scholars to exchange ideas with leading international experts in agriculture and technology.

FNU Researchers Shine

at the China Tech Fair

For the second time in attendance at the fair, Kumar, a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) scholar in crop genetics, explored the potential of advanced technology and artificial intelligence learning in agriculture during discussions with industry leaders.

The 30-year-old from Ba, who is also an Assistant Lecturer under the Department of Crop Science at CAFF, said it was an honour for him to represent Fiji and FNU on an international platform.

"The discussions with experts at the fair were eye-opening," Kumar said.

"The potential of artificial intelligence (AI) to transform agriculture through datadriven decision-making and sustainable practices is truly exciting, and I believe it has immense potential for Fiji's agricultural sector.

"We believe that by sharing knowledge and collaborating with international partners, we can make a significant contribution to achieving sustainable food security in Fiji."

Chand, an Assistant Lecturer at CAFF specialising in Agribusiness and Extension Education, leveraged the fair to build her network and gather valuable insights.

With her current PhD thesis focusing on IT and digital agriculture, Chand presented her research on empowering Fijian farmers through technology adoption at the "Agricultural Zhongguancun: Technical Achievements Matchmaking and Exchange Seminar.'

"Presenting on gender inclusivity in agricultural development was a valuable opportunity to connect with specialists and highlight the crucial role women play in Fiji's food security," she shared.

"Witnessing cutting-edge technologies like AI-powered crop yield prediction and drone-based pest control was truly inspiring.

'These advancements have the potential to revolutionise agriculture in Fiji and around the world."

"My family has been my pillar of strength. My father, a sailor himself, always encouraged me to persevere. He instilled in me the importance of faith, reminding me to pray and leave the rest to God to create the path for you."

His wife, Seruwaia Seruitamana, said she was proud of her husband's achievement. "Supporting ones' success is important, and I think we have been supporting him all the way and that is what women can do as strong support systems," Seruwaia said.
