In 1936, during the Bose Levu Vakaturaga, Ratu Sir Lala Sukuna, who was known for not mincing his words stated the following in the i-Taukei language:

"We cannot in these days adopt an attitude that will conflict with the welfare of those who like ourselves wish only to live peacefully and increase the wealth of the Colony (Fiji). We are doing our part here and so are they. We wish to live; they do the same. You should realise that money causes a close inter-relation of interests. If other communities are poor, we too remain poor; if they prosper, we will also prosper."

Visionary leaders sit among us daily and the duties of any university like the Fiji National University is to ensure that when visionary leaders like Ratu Sukuna have passed on, that their legacy lives on and be instilled in all students, staff, and academics.

Ratu Sir Lala Sukuna's story is a beautiful one to tell and to pass down to our younger generation.

We must continue to uphold his legacy and show care, kindness, empathy, and love to all Fijians, just as Ratu Sir Lala Sukuna did!
