### EMPOWERING ACADEMIC RESEARCH FOR FACULTY AND STUDENTS

As part of the ongoing training, the library in collaboration with the Centre for Graduate Studies conducted a 2-day virtual training session on the 25th and 26th of September. The team showcased 12 essential databases, including Knovel, JSTOR, SAGE Research Method, Medline Ultimate, ProQuest, Academic Complete, Science Direct, Education Research Complete, AGORA, Scopus, Taylor & Francis Online, and EBSCO Discoveries Services. This initiative is aimed at empowering both faculty and students by enhancing their research skills and access to high-quality academic resources

These databases provide access to a wealth of scholarly content, equipping researchers with the tools to conduct in-depth literature reviews, gather current data, and stay up to date with advancements in their fields. By exploring these resources, participants gained insights into leveraging each platform's unique features, improving research accuracy, and streamlining the search process. This training is part of a larger effort to promote academic excellence and foster a culture of research within the institution.





### MELBOURNE UNIVERSITY MASTER STUDENT VISIT FNU

A group of master's students from Melbourne, Australia, visited the Natabua campus library for an educational experience. They attended an Information Literacy (IL) session focused on introducing them to the library's extensive resources, research tools, and academic support services. The students expressed a strong interest in referencing tools, particularly EndNote, widely used by master's students for managing citations and references. The session provided a comprehensive overview of EndNote's features, demonstrating how it assists in organizing research materials, formatting citations in various styles, and ensuring academic integrity by preventing plagiarism. The session concluded with the students participating in a guided tour of the library, exploring study areas and the physical book collections. They were also shown how to access online databases and e-books, vital resources for postgraduate research.

#### ENHANCING ACADEMIC SUPPORT: GUIDED LIBRARY TOURS FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

A group of Free Bird students from Japan visited the Nasinu Campus library for a guided tour. The tour provided an opportunity for them to explore the library's facilities and understand the services available to support their academic needs. During the visit, we introduced the students to the study spaces, digital resources, and academic support services that can assist them in their studies. The tour emphasized how to access both physical and digital resources, ensuring they can make the most of what the library has to offer.

The Digital Section also engaged FNU scholars through a webinar focused on an in-depth exploration of ScopusAl—an intuitive, generative Al-powered search tool designed to enhance understanding and provide enriched insights with remarkable speed and clarity. The trial access to ScopusAl elevates the research experience by offering Al-driven tools that help uncover trends, assess research impact, and connect disciplines with greater efficiency. Following the CABI trial, which offers authoritative resources in agriculture, environmental science, and

#### ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES SUPPORT EXCELLENCE

The Administrative Services section of Fiji National University Library plays a vital role in ensuring the smooth operation of library facilities and programs. This section oversees critical aspects such as staff coordination, facility management, and resource allocation. During the semester break, from June 15th to July 14th, 2024, the library maintained reduced operational hours to accommodate maintenance and reorganisation efforts. Normal library hours resumed on July 15th, 2024. with the administrative team ensuring seamless transitions in library services, from event displays to the successful launch of the "My Book" Book Bank initiative.

Through their dedicated efforts, the administrative has continued team support the library's to role in fostering student engagement and learning. Whether through organising managing events or resources, the administrative team's work allows the library to function as a hub for academic and social enrichment.

### LIBRARY EVENTS

Our library celebrated numerous global and local events to foster community engagement and learning. Here is a chronological timeline of key events celebrated from July to September:

#### 18th July: Nelson Mandela

Nelson Mandela was a South African antiapartheid revolutionary, political leader, and philanthropist who served as President of South Africa from 1994 to 1999. He was the country's first black head of state and the first elected in a fully representative democratic election. The library set up a dedicated display featuring his life, achievements, and contributions to the world. This display not



only educates library users about Nelson Mandela but also inspires them to learn more about his impact and encourages them to contribute positively to society.



#### August 9th: International Day of the Indigenous Peoples

To promote awareness about the International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples, the library created a compelling and educational display that highlights the cultures, histories, and current issues facing indigenous peoples worldwide.

#### August 12th: International Youth Day

International Youth Day is celebrated annually on August 12th. This day is dedicated to recognizing the contributions of young people around the world, as well as raising awareness about the challenges and issues they face. It is an opportunity



to promote the active engagement of youth in social, economic, and political processes.

# August 12th – 16th: National Week of Action Against Bullying and Violence

The National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence (NDA) is an annual event in Australia dedicated to raising awareness about the issue of bullying and violence in schools and communities. This day is an opportunity for schools, students, parents, and the broader community to take a stand against bullying and promote a safe and supportive environment for everyone thus, to create awareness about the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence, the library set up the comprehensive and engaging display that educates users about bullying, its impacts, and ways to prevent and combat it.



August 19th: Raksha Bandhan Celebration

Raksha Bandhan is a traditional Hindu festival celebrated in India and by Indian communities around the world. The festival, also known simply as Rakhi, celebrates the bond of love, protection, and duty between brothers and sisters. The library set up an informative and engaging display on Raksha Bandhan to create awareness about the festival's cultural significance, history, and customs.



#### August 19th: World Humanitarian Day

World Humanitarian Day is observed annually on August 19th to honor humanitarian workers and raise awareness of humanitarian efforts worldwide. This day commemorates those who have lost their lives in humanitarian service and celebrates the spirit that inspires humanitarian work globally. The library display on World Humanitarian Day can help raise awareness about the importance of humanitarian work, educate the community on global humanitarian challenges, and inspire action and empathy.



## August 29th: International Day Against Nuclear Tests

International Day Against Nuclear Tests is observed annually on August 29. The United Nations General Assembly declared this day in December 2009 through resolution 64/35 to raise awareness about the dangers of nuclear weapon test explosions and the need to prevent such tests as a step toward achieving a safer and more secure world.



#### September 1st: Father's Day

Father's Day is an important occasion to recognize and celebrate the role of fathers and father figures in our lives. The library set up an informative display about Father's Day strengthening family bonds by reminding us to express gratitude for their ongoing influence in shaping our values and future.



#### September 7th: World Literacy Day

World Literacy Day, celebrated on September 8, highlights the crucial role of literacy as a fundamental human right and a driver of sustainable development. It raises awareness about the global challenges of illiteracy and promotes the importance of education in empowering individuals, reducing poverty, and fostering social and economic progress.



September 9th: International Day to Protect Education

The International Day to Protect Education from Attack is observed on September 9th each year. It's a day dedicated to raising awareness about the dangers and challenges faced by educational institutions and students in conflict zones around the world. The library did a display portraying the importance of protecting education and the global efforts to ensure that learning environments remain safe and secure.
